What is StAnD?

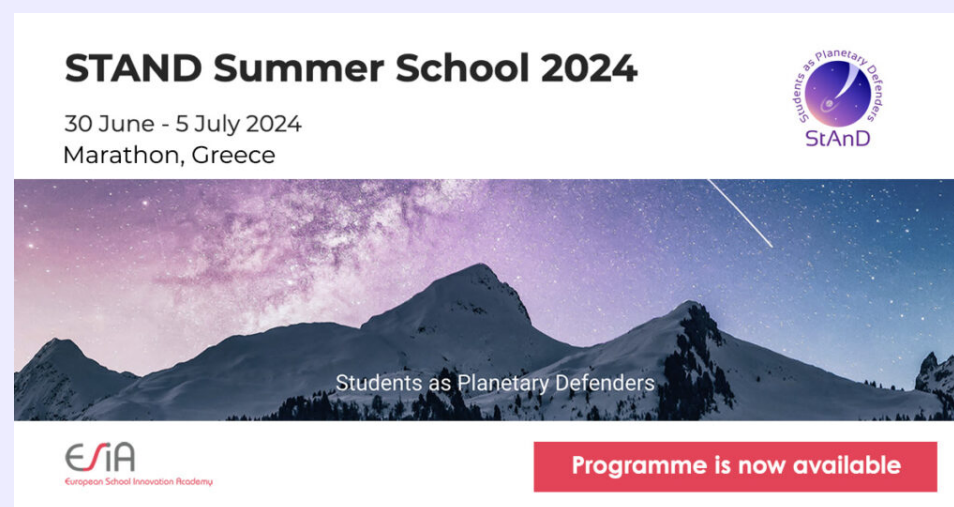
Students As Planetary Defenders (StAnD) is a project that aims to engage primary and secondary school students in the subject of asteroids, meteors, and planetary defence.
